Announcing Christmas - Small Group Discussion Guide

The Angel and Mary

Text: Luke 1:26-38

Warm-Up

- When you see a baby—whether in your family, church, or community—what kinds of questions or hopes naturally come to mind about who they might become?
- Why do you think questions about identity and future matter so much to us?

Observation - What Does the Text Say?

- 1. How does Luke describe Mary and her situation in verses 26–27? What details stand out as surprising or significant?
- 2. What does Gabriel announce about the child Mary will conceive (vv. 31–33)? Make a list of the titles or descriptions given to Jesus.
- 3. How does Mary respond to the angel's message in verse 34? How is her question different from Zechariah's earlier response (Luke 1:18)?
- 4. According to verses 35-37, how does Gabriel explain how this will happen?
- 5. How does the scene conclude in verse 38, and what does this reveal about Mary's posture before God?

Interpretation - What Does It Mean?

Jesus, the Son of Mary

- Why is it important that Jesus is given a common human name and born to a real human mother?
- How does the reality of Jesus' full humanity shape the way we understand the incarnation—and Christmas itself?
- How does the contrast between sentimental nativity scenes and the realities of a stable deepen our understanding of Jesus' humility?

Jesus, the Son of David

- Why does Luke emphasize Joseph's connection to David (vv. 26–27)?
- How do Gabriel's words echo Old Testament promises like 2 Samuel 7 and Psalm 2?
- What is the significance of a king whose kingdom will never end? How does this reshape expectations of power and authority?

Jesus, the Son of God

- How does Gabriel describe the role of the Holy Spirit in Jesus' conception (v. 35)?
- Why is it important to see this as creation language rather than biological or sexual language?
- What does it mean to confess that Jesus is one person with two complete natures—fully human and fully divine?

Application – How Do We Respond?

- As the Son of Mary, will Jesus be your Savior—the one who delivers you from sin and death?
- As the Son of David, will Jesus be your King—the one with rightful authority over your life?
- As the Son of God, will Jesus be your Lord—the one you worship, trust, and obey?

Living the Question This Advent

- Which aspect of Jesus' identity do you find easiest to embrace? Which is hardest?
- Where might God be inviting you, like Mary, to respond with trust rather than full understanding?
- What would it look like for you to echo Mary's words this week: "I am the Lord's servant...may it be to me as you have said"?

Prayer

Close by praying together:

- In gratitude that Jesus truly entered our world as one of us
- In submission to Jesus as the eternal King
- In worship of Jesus as the Son of God
- · Asking for hearts that respond faithfully to who Christ truly is
